We added new bird species in the following years:

2014

Fall count: American Coot, Green-winged Teal, and Rock Pigeon

2015

Fall count: Cooper's Hawk, Hairy Woodpecker, Say's Phoebe, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Belted Kingfisher, Eurasian Collared-Dove, and Rufous Hummingbird *Other observations*: Peregrine Falcon (October 19 by the Bird Mentoring Group)

2016

Fall count: Swainson's Hawk Mourning Dove, Horned Lark, and Yellow Warbler Great Egret (observed in May) and Wild Turkeys (observed in April)

2017

Spring count: Cinnamon Teal, Double-crested Cormorant, Broad-tailed Hummingbird, and Myrtle form of the Yellow-rumped Warbler Fall count: Sagebrush Sparrow and Cassin's Finch.

2018

Spring count: Savannah Sparrow

Fall count: Olive-sided Flycatcher, Cassin's Vireo, Plumbeous Vireo, Gray Catbird, Virginia's Warbler, and Lark Sparrow
